Government Facing Backlash over National Insurance (NI) Increase

In recent weeks, the Ministry of Pension and National Insurance (MPNI) has laid out plans to increase the NI amount by 1.25 percentage by April 2022 until April 2023. Well what does this mean? Each employee that earns a wage, contributes 12% to NI, this money goes towards Healthcare, Policing, Social Care and other public services. However this increase has been called a "punishing, unfair tax rise on working people" by Labour's Shadow Health Secretary Jonathan Ashworth. This backlash continued in the PMQ sessions, with the Labour Leader Kier Starmer highlighting the impact of this tax rise on minimum wage earners. The direct

impact of this tax rise is noted; however, the government has defended it by disclosing the benefits it will have on the NHS and Social Care. This tax rise will fund the NHS with an extra £36bn and an extra £5.4bn to reform the social care system. We see that the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, Sajid Javid, has whole-heartedly defended this controversial issue stating it is 'the fairest way possible to support us all'.

Our Post-Covid Economy

As people and nations, we have withstood a modern global pandemic, the fallout of Covid-19 has been immeasurable with over 4.5mil deaths globally. Thankfully, the vaccine created has slowed down the pace of Covid deaths and cases dramatically and now we are stuck in a limbo of sorts. As the world tries to go back to their lives before lockdown, believing that the worst is behind us.

What a lot of us have forgotten is that economists are calling it a prolonged recession. And as shown by China's economy right now it might be a recession that by the old economic standards is permanent. China is the first country to fully begin to go back to pre-Covid life, whether it be in public spending or work, they have managed to get their economy back to 90% of what it used to be. That might seem like a huge achievement and it is, but the missing 10% and its impact should not be underestimated. That is a huge chunk of a nation's economy that will never be recovered and in turn, nations which are more underdeveloped, might never recover from such a loss. The truth of the matter is that the global economy will never truly be as it once was. A huge reason for that has nothing to do with statistics or management but rather people's behaviour. A great example of this is Sweden, a country that had no formal lockdown and yet the public spending on things that would be considered "fun" actually mirrored that of Denmark's public "fun spending" - a country that had a very strict lockdown. This suggests that people are less willing to spend money on things that would not be considered as essential. This could be for a number of reasons like fear or caution, or maybe people are prioritising saving over spending, for a time they might need it. The reasons for this can be argued and listed, however they all lead to the same consequence, which is that this "fun spending" dip in the economy, will have huge implications for years to come.

These implications will take a while to show their true colours, however, as state aid is still in place. This is a whole different issue; however, it is important to note that once state aid starts to be withdrawn, it will unveil a large variety of problems, and perhaps some of the highest unemployment rates since the Great Depression in the 1930s. Once the state aid is withdrawn, we will

also get to see the recession's true shape. As of right now, it is looking to be a U-shape which implies that part of the economy lost will never be recovered, even if the economies of countries improve. A V-shaped recession would be the best possible outcome as it would imply that though there was a dip, the economy itself will heal. The worst possible outcome would be an L-shaped recession which could be catastrophic as it would mean the economy would never recover or grow. Most speculate that the truth lies somewhere in between and that different countries will have different recovery shapes, which leads us to the last question, who is to be most effected by all of this?

It's a hard pill to swallow for most of us, but it's not surprising that the people and countries that were worst off before Covid, will be the worst hit after Covid. On a global scale, as mentioned before the countries most effected would be underdeveloped countries. Losses won't be equal on a more local scale either, as jobs that pay less like the ones found in labour intensive industries or jobs that are done by women or ethnic minorities, such as leisure, hospitality or retail trade will be the most effected by all of this. Another group of people that will feel the aftershocks of all these problems is actually the youth, that includes the more recent graduates who will have a harder time than those before them finding jobs without experience, but also the students that are still currently studying. Those students will come out of education at different times, and at any given point they will notice that a lot of opportunities that were once there, will cease to exist.

All of these issues will form and shape the future world of politics. It will divide people and differing people from differing sides of the politic scale will emerge. So, you see, the post-Covid economic shape has huge implications not only on the present but on the future as a whole. As people who are living through it, there is no question in our minds that this scenario will be studied by future historians and economists, but as it stands we have no such blueprint to learn from, so what happens to the economy and how that impacts society post lockdown, is very much still up to speculation.

Looking back on the achievements of the England National team to reach the final of the Euros and the excitement of watching Team GB perform at the highest level during the Olympics and Paralympics.
